

SBC Milestone 4: Let's Celebrate!

There was a lot to celebrate in October for the implementation of SBC! Check out excerpts from two emails regarding a recent successful case consultation in Region 13, and the very first SBC case manager certification in Region 14.

Successful Case Consultation:

*"I just wanted to share with you guys a great experience that I had in Gwinnett County during a case consultation with Omar Simpson's team. His case manager, **Patricia Cureton**, was scheduled to present a case. She came very well prepared...During her presentation she constantly used the SBC language and informed us [about] how she interacted with the family. The family that she presented didn't even want to speak with DFCS in the beginning due to the mom having a [previous] bad experience with DFCS. Mom shared that she doesn't trust DFCS because when she was a child her family maltreated her...and DFCS...didn't do anything for her...Due to Patricia's engagement skills the family opened to her in such a way...She was even able to build a consensus with this family. Patricia is a real SBC champion..."*
